- Chapter Readings and Quizzing
 - Students will complete chapter quizzes online which incorporate and cover chapter readings (40% of final grade)
- Discussions
 - Covering the corresponding chapter, students will participate in class discussions which cover topics related to assigned readings and content, a minimum of one additional comment is always required (30% of final grade)
- Sociology Labs
 - Covering the corresponding chapter, students will complete an activity, project or assignment relating to assigned readings and content (30% of final grade)
